
2014/15 Study Abroad Annual Report

Enrollment:


This academic year we had 581 students study abroad. We saw 10 students participate in multiple studying abroad programs during the course of the year, giving Study Abroad 591 applications. The last two academic years we have had 29 students participate in multiple study abroad programs.

Undergraduates:



This academic year all summer study abroad programs for the School of Law were cancelled. However, we had record numbers of graduate students apply and participate in the School of Professional Summer programs. The Virtual Campus team has determined a strategy that is attracting more students than we have space for on some programs. Development of graduate study abroad programs in other academic areas is still an on-going conversation from last year.

Graduates:




Colleges & Schools:

Study Abroad Programs and Destinations:

The percentage of students participating in the different programs has remained stable the last two years. With slight percentage increase for faculty-led and slight decreases for Gonzaga-in-Florence.



18 faculty-led programs were proposed this academic year. 2 programs were cancelled due to health issue in African. 4 were cancelled due to low enrollments.

Several of the sponsored programs are increasing their overall enrollment as more departments have vetted them for academic rigor and feel that they meet the standards of Gonzaga.

Duration:

Gonzaga continues to be a leader in the percentage of students study abroad for a semester. Unfortunately, our academic year numbers have decrease significantly. The reduction in numbers comes primarily from the Gonzaga-in-Florence Program. Analysis has led us to the conclusion that the cost of a full year program in Florence is out of the financial reach of many students.

Pre-Departure:

Students:

Starting in the last summer the Study Abroad Office began to overhaul its pre-departure training. In years past the pre-departure training focused on safety and security. After going through two testing phases in the fall and spring semester we have discovered a series of training that will help to educate the students on cultural differences of study abroad while also continuing to give them the safety and security that students need for living and traveling in other countries.

Session 1: Students will watch the webinar by Dr. Joe Kinsella, Assistant Academic Vice-President for Global Engagement, on culture and identity. They will then play BAFA BAFSA for two hours.

- a) To help students come to understand the meaning and impact of culture
- b) To demonstrate how one's feelings of attachment to a given culture are learned though the processes of socialization, and that one's tendency to judge other cultures is based on one's own cultural perspective.
- c) To demonstrate the potential for misinterpretation that arises when one evaluates another culture solely from the perspective of one's own values
- d) To build awareness of the extent to which cultures can vary (cultural difference) and to help students work through these differences
- e) To help students to come to appreciate cultural diversity and to examine their attitudes and behaviors towards others who are 'different' than themselves.

When students leave BAFA BAFA they will be given a journal to start journaling how the experience of playing BAFA BAFA made them fill.

Session 2: Students will meet with their BAFA BAFA facilitator to discuss BAFA BAFA and what they wish to share from their journals.

Session 3: Student will attend a safety and security session to prepare them for traveling and living outside the United States.

Parent:

This academic year we did our first Parent Pre-Departure Sessions.

Fall Family Weekend: We held our first session and several parents show up for the session, but not as many as expected. Many of the parents expressed appreciate for the information we did share. However, our focus is on promoting the parents to "guide from the sideline." We are trying to inform the parents that study abroad will have high's and low's for students. We are working with Angela Ruff to increase participation at the fall sessions.

Webinar: April 21 at 7:00 pm we held the first webinar. We emailed a link to all of the parents we were given permission to talk. We broke the university record and had well over 160 people view the session and 30 to 40 parents request that we share the recorded video with them because they missed it. We had students from Marquette, LMU and several other universities watch our session. The response from parents was overwhelming good. However, we might need to have separate sessions for Florence, Paris and other programs.
